



A Brief History

In 1742, at a time when fines were levied for non-attendance at church, a "Chapel of Ease" was built in the hamlet of Hey, on the Lancashire – Yorkshire border so that the inhabitants of the district could attend Divine Service without having to travel three or four miles to the mother church in Ashton-under-Lyne. Indeed the church authorities were responsible for appointing a constable to pursue the miscreants with the fines being used for the benefit of Hey Sunday School.

Built of local stone, by local people, the structure was originally four windows long and was extended twice, in 1772 and 1843. With galleries on all four walls and high-backed box-pews, the building could accommodate 730 people.

In the mid-nineteenth century the chapel closed for a year while major alterations were made to the interior. On 24th June 1869, the chapel re-opened and two months later was assigned a parish with boundaries of its own, no longer tied to Ashton.



Around 1870, the stained glass east window was installed, and is shown in this picture with the original Georgian semi-circular topped windows still in place on the southern elevation.

Over the next 20 years, Gothic-style stained-glass windows were installed depicting scenes from the life of Christ and were designed by Capronnier of Brussels. For nearly a century the layout remained the same, with blocks of pews and two aisles There were galleries on three sides and an organ loft at the

west end. The second storey stained glass was installed after a fund raising Bazaar in 1905.

There have been 17 incumbents at St John during its history, the longest serving of whom was George Docker Grundy who is commemorated in the brass plaque on the south wall of the church together with the adjacent stained glass window; this window depicts most of the second chapter of St Luke's gospel. When Rev Grundy arrived at St John it was customary for the adults in the parish to attend school on a Sunday to learn to read and write; Rev Grundy put a stop to that, saying Sunday is for church. During his time Rev Grundy administered the opening of 7 schools in the parish, adults were able to attend these schools after work during the week, much more detail is given in the history book.

In 1987 a serious fire destroyed much of the woodwork and organ and damage from water and subsequent damp led to rot in the floor, screens and walls. A decision was made to remove all flooring, galleries and pews and to re-order the whole interior. The altar was brought forward to provide a more flexible use of space, and there is now a central aisle with chairs on each side. Fortunately the windows, although damaged were repairable and the fine Reredos escaped unscathed. The cupola was also restored and was short-listed for the John Betjeman prize in 1991. It is an attractive focal point in the parish. Over the years the Reredos had been painted over several times, in 2012 it was fully restored and can now be appreciated in all its glory as it would have been when installed.

The picture on the back of this newsletter is the bottom row centre panel of the east window, behind the altar, and depicts St John the Baptist Baptising Jesus. 



Pentecost


On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of Firstfruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, He had risen, and He had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so they waited – on Him, and for Him. They were not disappointed: for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ's body here on earth. Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now His Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, His body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their sins, and to follow him.














