Dear Francis

When you read this, the schools will have closed for their summer holidays and no doubt, many of you will be preparing for your own summer break. Taking time for rest and relaxation helps us to maintain a healthy balance in our lives and is essential for our well being. Yes, I know, I should practice what I preach – and as I notice my own personal signs of over busyness, I am reminded of the story that Lynda Neilands tells of the knights who went to the coast.

The story goes that two knights, who had worked hard to rescue damsels in distress and keep the land free of dragons and would be invaders, were looking very tired, so the king ordered that they should go to the coast, sunbathe, swim, build sandcastles and kick a ball about on the sand. This was so that they might return, invigorated, refreshed and renewed. Having collected the necessary items of bucket, spade, football, sun cream etc. the knights set off for their holiday.

Once they arrived, they set about obeying the Kings orders. After a couple of days they began to confide in each other about how they felt. It turned out that they were more weary than ever. Running around after a ball was just too exhausting, and kicking it was not only difficult, it meant you had to chase it even more. And as for lying in the sun, it was sheer torture, the heat was unbearable. The worst thing however was trying to swim; both knights had nearly drowned. The king was expecting them to return refreshed, renewed and invigorated. What were they to do?

Suddenly, one knight had an idea. "Maybe it would be better if we took our armour off", he said.

The second knight was horrified. He protested that a knight should never be seen without his armour. Much to his horror, his friend removed his armour and proceeded to have a fine time on his holiday. To make matters worse, it seemed to be working! The knight without his armour was looking relaxed, happy and full of vitality.

This children's story made me think several things and ask several questions which could be applied to our lives as individuals and as a Church:

Different situations call for different approaches. We should never try to make one set of rules apply to all situations.

Do we put on armour? The Bible speaks of the armour of God, but often we try to protect ourselves by other means. People who have been hurt often seem stand-offish as a means of self protection. People who haven't fully accepted God's forgiveness often hide behind the armour of self righteousness, not wanting anyone to see (least of all themselves) what they perceive to be the sin within. Can we trust God enough to remove our armour and feel the freedom that it brings?

Are we, like the knight who refused to remove his armour, hurting ourselves by trying too hard to keep up appearances? Are we trying to be seen as we think others want to see us? Is my busyness really born out of a desire to serve, or is it a desire to be valued? Is it just an armour against any accusation of shortcomings, or even a selfish desire to succeed?

The knights were weighed down by their armour, what are the things that weigh us down? Is there anything that God would like us to let go of?

Are we, like the knight who retained his armour, afraid of change? Do we doggedly hang on to that which we know rather than experiment with new ideas? Not all new ideas work well in practice, but we will never know if we never try.

Oh dear, this sounds dangerously near to a vicar who's about to spring weird and wonderful new ideas onto our perfectly acceptable current systems, and that first year where I promised to observe current practices before making changes is almost past. Worry not! I simply want us all to keep an open mind, and to examine ourselves, as individuals and as a Church, to see A) whether we are maintaining a healthy balance in our lives, B) whether God wants to relieve us of unnecessary burdens and C) whether we are open to God's promptings to change.

I pray that you will all take time out for fun this summer, that you will all take time to reflect and that you will all be refreshed, renewed and invigorated.

Naomi and Ruth had returned to Bethlehem as widows. Ruth had worked during the harvest in the fields of Boaz, a near relative.


Naomi told her daughter-in-law Ruth You need someone to marry and look after you. I have a plan
