Dear Frances

The season of Advent is almost upon us once again. Each day through Advent, at Morning Prayer, we repeat some words from Psalm 24, they are as follows:

"Lift up your heads O gates, be lifted up, you everlasting doors and the king of glory shall come in."

In older versions of the Bible there is reference to lintels and portals; the psalmist was probably referring to the doorways of the Temple. He saw them as too low for the king of glory to enter through. (The idea of the glory of the Lord leaving the Temple meant that it needed to be ready to receive Him on His return.) The psalmist wants to emphasise the enormity of the Lord God Almighty, the doors of the Temple need to be very big in order to give access to Him. As Christians, we think in terms of God living, not in the Temple, but in our hearts. As we read the words of psalm 24, we should be encouraged to make more room in our hearts for the magnitude of God's love to enter. God's entrance into our hearts requires much openness of heart on our part. God's grace moves freely in a big heart with a large doorway of welcome. Even if we have long since made that step of inviting the Lord Jesus into our hearts, we still need to consider how much room we are giving to Him today.

The busyness and pressure of all that we have to do in December, all the preparations for Christmas, can leave our hearts feeling anything but big and open! Fatigue and stress can leave us feeling grumpy and short tempered. How easy is it to snap at those around us? Harsh words and sharp judgements are just waiting to leap out of our mouths. The doorways to our hearts at such times are very tiny indeed. As Christmas draws near, let's check the size of our hearts' doors to see if any expanding needs to take place to let the God of glory enter in.

Then, having used Advent as a time of self searching, let us fling wide the doors, inviting Jesus, once again, to lighten the darker corners of our hearts with the light of His presence, His mercy and His grace. Let us welcome too, God's Holy Spirit, who will equip us to do all that is needed tidy to up those dark corners so that we might celebrate the wonderful event of Christmas and face the New Year with a heart full of Christian love that reveals something of the glory of God.

May you all have a blessed season of Advent, a splendid Christmas and a very happy New Year.

- 17) Pass children's spare toys to a playgroup
- 18) Leave a treat for the postman/woman
- 19) Invite neighbours for a cup of tea in memory of MP Jo Cox (www.greatgettogther.org)
- 20) Make and deliver a Christmas card for a class at Hey with Zion
- 21) Sing carols outside the Co-op
- 22) Give a fair trade present
- 23) Donate your expertise
- 24) Pay a brief visit to an elderly neighbour
- 25) Enjoy Christmas Day

What's next for St John's?

There has been a Chapel at St John the Baptist, Hey for over 275 years. The world has changed enormously since then, but throughout that time St John the Baptist, Hey has stood as a witness to the Christian faith and the presence of God amongst us. Local people in every generation since then, have gathered in this church to pray and worship each with their own lives and journey of faith shaping the faith community at St John's. This is an incredible tradition and legacy of which we should be very proud. We stand in and with a great cloud of witnesses who have received and taught the Christian faith and passed the baton on to us.

And it is our turn to continue that tradition. We are St John's in this generation. However old or young, brand new or having served at St John's for many years, we are the church and together we are called to love God and to love our neighbours. In 2015, with Richard's upcoming retirement in mind, St John's set about preparing and publishing a Mission Action Plan. This included a widespread consultation with the local community as well as lots of practical planning to maintain the ministry of the St John's during the forthcoming interregnum. It's great to see how much of the plan was implemented and how many of its goals were achieved. As ever, the world never stands still but God is faithful. We are now in a very different position. We have Lyn in post as our rector and having had a year to settle in and take stock, it's time to look afresh at where we are as a church and where we think God is leading us. To give thanks for all that has gone before and for all that God has done and, building on that, to look ahead to what God might be calling us to do next.

As a first step we would like to invite you all to "What's next?" a morning in church where we can talk and share ideas and opportunities that might be available to us in this next stage of the church's life. Everybody is welcome whether you have been at St John's for 50 years or 5

minutes. We are all part of God's church here in Hey and if the Bible is anything to go by God is pretty good at using unexpected and sometimes unsuspecting people to work out His plans. Whether they think they are too young (think King David) or think they are too old (think Abraham or Elizabeth) God calls us all and values us all and any church which seeks to be inclusive is a church that seeks to do the same. Whether you come with three generations of your family or come on your own. Whether you come on a Sunday, or on a Wednesday, or on a Thursday, or aren't able to come every week, everybody counts and everybody has something to offer. We would really like as many people as possible to come along and get involved however you can.

"What's next?" will be on Saturday 8th February 2020 from 10am to 1pm with refreshments from 9.30am. It will include a bring and share lunch. Please do put it in your diary. There will be ways for children to be involved as well as adults and we hope it will be an enjoyable day filled with fun and fellowship and that as many people as possible will be able to join us to think, talk, pray, and plan, together as a church as we look forward with hope and expectation to what God will do next in the life of the parish.







Earlier today, the Saviour, Christ the Lord, was born in Bethlehem.









